Immigrant workers and business owners grow DC's economy

100,000 immigrants reside in Washington, DC. Immigrants work in low-wage, middle-wage, and higher-wage jobs in sectors across DC's economy.



27% of business owners in DC are immigrants,

spurring innovation, hiring workers, and adding locally owned storefront shops that help make DC neighborhoods vibrant



30% of construction laborers



18% of DC workers are immigrants, including:

42% of child care workers




20% of physicians

Immigrant workers and business owners generate billions of dollars in economic output in DC. Immigrant workers account for 16% of the economic output of the resident DC labor force.

Immigration increases opportunity for Washington, DC

When immigrants move to DC, the economy grows. That doesn't mean fewer jobs, it means more jobs: there are more consumers, more workers, and more business owners. Study after study shows there is no fixed number of jobs in a local economy. Immigration creates opportunities that benefit US-born workers too.
